Lesser Whistling Duck Dendrocygna Javanica

Seen on three days with the highest count of c500 at a site near Tha Lang.

Garganey Spatula querquedula

Three or four seen at Hat Chao Samron Marshes.

Rufous-throated Partridge Arborophila rufogularis

Three seen really well from the boardwalk at the top of Doi Inthanon NP.

Mrs. Hume's Pheasant Syrmaticus humiae

Four (3 females and 1 male) seen at the stakeout at Doi Lang.

Kalij Pheasant Lophura leucomelanos

Seen on two days at Kaeng Krachan. A pair on the drive up and at least three from the hide including a fine male.

Green Peafowl Pavo muticus

A nice surprise to visit the lek at Ban Hong Nonhunting Area, where we had about twenty individuals including displaying males.

Green-legged Partridge Tropicoperdix

chloropus

Three of these hard to see species showed up from the Kaeng Krachan hide.

Grey Peacock-pheasant Polyplectron bicalcaratum

Heard every day at Kaeng Krachan but not seen.



Mountain Bamboo Partridge Bambusicola fytchii

Six seen by the roadside on our drive down from Doi Lang.

Red Junglefowl Gallus gallus

Seen on four days at both Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai with the best views from the hide at Kaeng Krachan.

Great Eared Nightjar Lyncornis macrotis

One seen well at dusk in Khao Yai on 12 January.

Large-tailed Nightjar Caprimulgus macrurus

Seen on two dates when returning from Kaeng Krachan.

Indian Nightjar Caprimulgus asiaticus

Seen very well at Laem Pak Bia Royal Project and in the morning at Ban Ton Maphrao.

Crested Treeswift Hemiprocne coronate

Fly over of around 3-4 birds noted at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project.

Grey-rumped Treeswift Hemiprocne longipennis

A couple seen flying over at Kaeng Krachan.

Germain's Swiftlet Aerodramus germani

Large numbers of swiflets, presumed to be this species, were seen on three days in the lowlands in the Pak Thale area.

Brown-backed Needletail Hirundapus giganteus

Seen on two days in Khao Yai with a high count of about 100.

Asian Palm Swift Cypsiurus balasiensis

Seen on four days during the trip at various locations.

Cook's Swift Apus cooki

Good numbers seen on two days in Doi Lang and Doi Ang Khang with the highest count of c.50.

House Swift Apus nipalensis

Seen at Bangkok Airport before catching our flight to Chaing Rai.

Greater Coucal Centropus sinensis

Common and seen on seven days.

Green-billed Malkoha Phaenicophaeus tristis

First seen at Kaeng Krachan with singles seen on five days in total.

Asian Koel Eudynamys scolopaceus

Common throughout. Heard or seen on most days of the trip.

Asian Emerald Cuckoo Chrysococcyx maculatus

Two males on the same day in Kaeng Krachan. A forest gem.

Violet Cuckoo Chrysococcyx xanthorhynchus

A male was seen well in Kaeng Krachan calling at the top of a leafless tree.

Banded Bay Cuckoo Cacomantis sonneratii

Heard on a number of occasions before one responded and showed well at Khao Yai.

Plaintive Cuckoo Cacomantis merulinus

The only bird seen was on our first day.

Square-tailed Drongo-cuckoo Surniculus lugubris

Two birds seen on two dates in Kaeng Krachan.

Large Hawk-cuckoo Hierococcyx sparverioides

Heard only at Doi Lang.

Rock Dove (Feral) Columba livia 'feral'

Common and seen most days.

Speckled Wood Pigeon Columba hodgsonii

We failed to see this bird on our first attempt up Doi Inthanon due to fog, but had more success with clear skies the following day, with about twelve birds present in the roost.

Ashy Wood Pigeon Columba pulchricollis

A couple seen flying over in the mist on our first morning at Doi Inthanon was followed by a perched bird when the weather started to clear.

Oriental Turtle Dove Streptopelia orientalis

A small flock of eight birds was nice to see at the 'Pheasant' stakeout on Doi Lang.

Red Collared Dove Streptopelia tranquebarica

Common throughout (except in the highlands) and seen on eight days.

Spotted Dove Spilopelia chinensis

Common throughout (except in the highlands) and seen on ten days.

Barred Cuckoo-dove Macropygia unchall

Heard only at Khao Yai.

Common Emerald Dove Chalcophaps indica

Seen on two days at Kaeng Krachan with the best views from the bird hide.

Zebra Dove Geopelia striata

Common throughout (except in the highlands) and seen on eight days.

Thick-billed Green Pigeon Treron curvirostra

Seen in Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai on four dates with a high count of c.20.

Yellow-vented Green Pigeon Treron seimundi

One seen in a fruiting tree in Khao Yai.

Wedge-tailed Green Pigeon Treron sphenurus

Two birds seen near a fruiting tree in Kaeng Krachan were the only ones noted on the trip.

Mountain Imperial Pigeon Ducula badia

Good numbers were noted on three separate dates in Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai, nearly all fly overs, but good views all the same.

Common Moorhen Gallinula chloropus

Just a couple noted on our first day at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes.

Eurasian Coot Fulica atra

A couple seen at Laem Pak Bia Royal Project.

Grey-headed Swamphen Porphyrio poliocephalus

A couple seen at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes.

Ruddy-breasted Crake Zapornia fusca

Heard at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes but seen well the following day at Laem Pak Bia Royal Project.

Slaty-legged Crake Rallina eurizonoides

Probably two separate birds came in to the pool in front of the hide in Kaeng Krachan. A shy and difficult to see species in normal circumstances. They run like grease lightning!

White-browed Crake Poliolimnas cinereus

Eventually an individual showed well at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes.

White-breasted Waterhen Amaurornis phoenicurus

Fairly common. Seen or heard on a least five days.

Little Grebe Tachybaptus ruficollis

Seen in small numbers on the first two days of the trip.

Indian Stone-Curlew Burhinus indicus

Seen well at Tha Lang with c.15 birds present on 7 January.

Black-winged Stilt Himantopus Himantopus

Common in the salt pans, marshes and rice paddies around Khok Kham and Pak Thale.

Grey-headed Lapwing Vanellus cinereus

Seen on three separate dates with the first small flock being seen at Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on day one.

Red-wattled Lapwing Vanellus indicus

A common species and seen on seven days.

Pacific Golden Plover Pluvialis fulva

Small numbers seen around Khok Kham and Pak Thale.

Grey Plover Pluvialis squatarola

Just one or two in the wader flocks at Khok Kham and Pak Thale.

Long-billed Plover Charadrius placidus

After a lot of searching, we finally found three at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project on 17 January.

Little Ringed Plover Charadrius dubius

Seen on two days with about six at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project.

Kentish Plover Charadrius alexandrines

Seen at both Pak Thale and Laem Pak Bia with a high count of c.15.

White-faced Plover Charadrius dealbatus

We felt very fortunate to find a single bird at Laem Pak Bia on 7 January as this bird can be easily missed due to a high level of disturbance.

Malaysian Plover Charadrius peronii

Seen at Laem Pak Bia with a count of at least six including some very well marked males.

Greater Sand Plover Charadrius leschenaultia

Good numbers at Pak Thale.

Tibetan Sand Plover Charadrius atrifrons

Large numbers were seen on the first two days of the trip at various locations, by far the commoner of the two species of Sand Plover present.

Greater Painted-snipe Rostratula benghalensis

Just a couple seen by some of the group in flight at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes on 6 January.

Pheasant-tailed Jacana Hydrophasianus chirurgus

Four at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes on 6 January.

Bronze-winged Jacana Metopidius indicus

Four at Phraek Nam Daeng Marshes on 6 January.

Eurasian Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus

Seen at a few locations on the first two days of the trip.

Eurasian Curlew Numenius Arquata

A single bird as we headed back from Laem Pak Bia.

Bar-tailed Godwit Limosa lapponica

Good numbers at Pak Thale.

Black-tailed Godwit Limosa limosa

Large numbers at Pak Thale, also seen at a number of other locations on the first couple of days of the trip.

Ruddy Turnstone Arenaria interpres

One at Pak Thale.

Great Knot Calidris tenuirostris

Good to see large numbers of this species at Pak Thale and smaller numbers at Khok Kham.

Red Knot Calidris canutus

One or two at Pak Thale.

Ruff Calidris pugnax

Small numbers at various locations on the first two days of the trip.

Broad-billed Sandpiper Calidris falcinellus

A large flock of c.100 at Pak Thale was lovely to see.

Curlew Sandpiper Calidris ferruginea

Good numbers at various locations on the first two days of the trip.

Temminck's Stint Calidris temminckii

A nice surprise to find four together in a ditch at Wat Khom Naran on 7 January.

Long-toed Stint Calidris subminuta

Not so easy to find with c.10 located at Hat Chao Samran marshes on 7 January.

Spoon-billed Sandpiper Calidris pygmaea

One of the key species for the trip. We 'twitched' a bird at Khok Kham on the first day. The bird was found quite quickly and showed really well. Such a delight to see and so sad that numbers are going down year on year. Apparently, there are just eight or nine individuals in Thailand this winter.

Red-necked Stint Calidris ruficollis

Large numbers of this species were seen at various locations on the first two days.

Sanderling Calidris alba

Small numbers at both Pak Thale and Laem Pak Bia.

Asian Dowitcher Limnodromus semipalmatus

We were amazed to record 800-1000 at a large wader roost by the side of the main road at Pak Thale on 8 January.

Pin-tailed Snipe Gallinago stenura

A single seen in flight at Mae Ai paddy fields on 16 January with another 'on the deck' at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project the next day.

Common Snipe Gallinago gallinago

Seen on three days with the highest number present at Mae Ai paddy fields.

Red-necked Phalarope Phalaropus lobatus

A small flock of 15 or so at Pak Thale.

Common Sandpiper Actitis hypoleucos

Seen on four days of the trip.

Green Sandpiper Tringa ochropus

Seen on four days of the trip.

Common Redshank Tringa tetanus

Small numbers seen on the first two days.

Marsh Sandpiper Tringa stagnatilis

Good numbers seen on the first two days.

Wood Sandpiper Tringa glareola

Good numbers, particularly at Hat Chao Samran marshes.

Spotted Redshank Tringa erythropus

Small numbers at Pak Thale.

Common Greenshank Tringa nebularia

Small numbers at Pak Thale.

Nordmann's Greenshank Tringa guttifer

It was fantastic to see a flock of about 200 individuals at the same wader roost where the Asian Dowitchers were present at Pak Thale on 7 January.

Small Pratincole Glareola lacteal

Four flying over at Tha Ton on 14 January were followed by 15 roosting birds at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project on 17 January.

Brown-headed Gull Chroicocephalus brunnicephalus

Small numbers were seen on the first two days.

Gull-billed Tern Gelochelidon nilotica

A couple of birds at Pak Thale.

Caspian Tern Hydroprogne caspia

A sizeable roost at Pak Thale numbered c.40 birds.

Greater Crested Tern Thalasseus bergii

A couple seen at Pak Thale.

Little Tern Sternula albifrons

Seen in small numbers at both Khok Kham and Pak Thale.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

One seen at Khok Kham mangroves.

Whiskered Tern Chlidonias hybrida

Good numbers seen at various locations on the first two days of the trip.

Asian Openbill Anastomus oscitans

Seen on five days of the trip.

Painted Stork Mycteria leucocephala

Seen on the first three days of the trip with a flock of about 300 birds at Pak Thale.

Oriental Darter Anhinga melanogaster

Uncommon with just a couple of birds seen on the first two days of the trip.

Little Cormorant *Microcarbo niger*

Common. Seen on seven days of the trip.

Indian Cormorant Phalacrocorax fuscicollis

Common on the coast.

Black-headed Ibis Threskiornis melanocephalus

Five birds at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Yellow Bittern Ixobrychus sinensis

Seen well at Hat Chao Samran marshes on 7 January where at least four individuals were present.

Black-crowned Night Heron Nycticorax nycticorax

A few seen at Laem Pak Bia Royal Project on 7 January.

Striated Heron Butorides striata

Not common but seen on three separate dates.

Chinese Pond Heron Ardeola bacchus

Common. Seen on eight days.

Javan Pond Heron Ardeola speciosa

Common on the coast.

Eastern Cattle Egret Bubulcus coromandus

Common. Seen on nine days.

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

Seen on three days.

Purple Heron Ardea purpurea

Seen on the first three days of the trip.

Great Egret Ardea alba

Common, particularly at the coast.

Intermediate Egret Ardea intermedia

Common and logged on five days.

Little Egret Egretta garzetta

Very common and seen on twelve days.

Pacific Reef Heron Egretta sacra

Around four or five were seen on day two at Laem Pak Bia.

Chinese Egret Egretta eulophotes

Some really good information from our boatman at Laem Pak Bia resulted in us finding one at Pak Thale on 7 January.

Black-winged Kite Elanus caeruleus

Sadly, just a single bird was seen from the van on 17 January. The species has crashed due to pressure from the pet trade.

Crested Honey Buzzard Pernis ptilorhynchus

Fairly common and seen on four days during the trip.

Jerdon's Baza Aviceda jerdoni

Singles were seen in flight on two days at Kaeng Krachan.

Black Baza Aviceda leuphotes

A distant bird in flight at Khao Yai was followed by a perched individual which was seen really well at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project on 17 January.

Crested Serpent Eagle Spilornis cheela

Surprisingly just the one by the roadside in Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Black Eagle Ictinaetus malaiensis

A single bird seen in flight at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Greater Spotted Eagle Clanga clanga

A single bird at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Crested Goshawk Accipiter trivirgatus

Single birds were seen on two days in Kaeng Krachan.

Shikra Accipiter badius

Singles seen on three days during the trip.

Eastern Marsh Harrier Circus spilonotus

Three or four individuals at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Pied Harrier Circus melanoleucos

A couple seen at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Black Kite Milvus migrans

Fairly common and seen on four days of the trip.

Brahminy Kite Haliastur indus

Seen on the first three days spent near the coast.

Rufous-winged Buzzard Butastur liventer

Seen on three days of the trip. The first bird at Khao Yai delivered the best views on 13 January.

Grey-faced Buzzard Butastur indicus

Seen on two days of the trip with single birds on 8 and 11 January.

Brown Boobook Ninox scutulata

A single bird seen early in the morning at Kaeng Krachan.

Collared Owlet Taenioptynx brodiei

Heard at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Spotted Owlet Athene brama

A single bird was seen well in our resort at Doi Inthanon on 17 January.

Asian Barred Owlet Glaucidium cuculoides

Having heard birds at various locations, we finally had great views of a single individual in the resort grounds at Tha Ton on 17 January.

Collared Scops Owl Otus lettia

A single bird seen well near our resort on 10 January.

Buffy Fish Owl Ketupa ketupu

Really nice to see a youngster on the nest and an adult bird perched up nearby at Khao Yai on 12 January.

Orange-breasted Trogon Harpactes oreskios

Seen on two dates in Kaeng Krachan with three birds seen together on 10 January.

A pair of these beautiful birds showed well on 9 January at Kaeng Krachan.

Eurasian Hoopoe Upupa epops

See on two dates in the North.

Great Hornbill Buceros bicornis

Seen on four dates of the trip at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Oriental Pied Hornbill Anthracoceros albirostris

Common and seen on six days of the trip.

Tickell's Brown Hornbill Anorrhinus tickelli

A flock of 10-12 birds were watched coming in to a fruiting tree at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Wreathed Hornbill Rhyticeros undulatus

Seen on four dates of the trip at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Indochinese Roller Coracias affinis

Fairly common and seen on six days of the trip.

Banded Kingfisher (Banded) Lacedo pulchella

A male seen well at Khao Yai on 12 January.

White-throated Kingfisher Halcyon smyrnensis

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Black-capped Kingfisher Halcyon pileate

A couple of birds on our boat trip to Laem Pak Bia.

Collared Kingfisher Todiramphus chloris

Fairly common on the coast and seen on numerous occasions on the first two days of the trip.

Common Kingfisher Alcedo atthis

Fairly common and seen on five dates.

Red-bearded Bee-eater Nyctyornis amictus

We put quite a lot of effort in to seeing this bird and were finally rewarded with excellent views at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Blue-bearded Bee-eater Nyctyornis athertoni

Seen well at Khao Yai on 12 January and Doi Lang on 15 January.

Asian Green Bee-eater Merops orientalis

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Blue-tailed Bee-eater Merops philippinus

Seen at Wat Khom Naran on 7 January.

Common and seen on six days.

Great Barbet Psilopogon virens

Heard on three days.

Lineated Barbet Psilopogon lineatus

Seen well in the grounds of our resort at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Green-eared Barbet Psilopogon faiostrictus

Seen on three dates in Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Red-throated Barbet Psilopogon mystacophanos

A single bird seen well at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Golden-throated Barbet (Malayan) Psilopogon franklinii ramsayi

Seen on three days in the Highlands.

Blue-throated Barbet (Blue-crowned) Psilopogon asiaticus davisoni

One at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Moustached Barbet *Psilopogon incognitus*

See on two days in Khao Yai.

Blue-eared Barbet Psilopogon duvaucelii

Seen on a total of four days at Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.



Coppersmith Barbet Psilopogon haemacephalus

Fairly common and seen on three days.

Eurasian Wryneck Jynx torquilla

Seen on two days.

Speckled Piculet Picumnus innominatus

Two birds seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

White-browed Piculet Sasia ochracea

A single bird seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Heart-spotted Woodpecker Hemicircus canente

A pair was seen in flight at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January. A single bird was then observed really well at Khao Yai on 12 January.

Grey-capped Pygmy Woodpecker Yungipicus canicapillus

Seen well at Doi Lang and Doi Ang Khang.

Freckle-breasted Woodpecker Dendrocopos analis

Seen well at both Hat Chao Samron marshes on 7 January and Ban Ton marshes on 8 January.

Stripe-breasted Woodpecker Dendrocopos atratus

One seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

White-bellied Woodpecker Dryocopus javensis Heard only at Doi Inthanon NP. Greater Yellownape Chrysophlegma flavinucha Fairly common and seen on three days. Streak-breasted Woodpecker Picus viridanus Heard on two days at Kaeng Krachan. Laced Woodpecker Picus vittatus Seen well at Khoi Yai on 12 January. Black-headed Woodpecker Picus erythropygius After quite a bit of effort we finally saw one on our last day at Doi Inthanon NP on 20 January. Common Flameback Dinopium javanense Seen on two days in Kaeng Krachan. Greater Flameback Chrysocolaptes guttacristatus Fairly common and seen on four days of the trip. Bay Woodpecker Blythipicus pyrrhotis Heard on three separate occasions with only the briefest (non-tickable) flight views at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January. Great Slaty Woodpecker Mulleripicus pulverulentus Heard only at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Collared Falconet *Microhierax caerulescens*

One seen perched at Doi Inthanon NP in the dry forest on 19 January.

Black-thighed Falconet Microhierax fringillarius

One seen perched up at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Common Kestrel Falco tinnunculus

Seen on three days.

Blossom-headed Parakeet Psittacula roseate

Seen coming in to a roost in Doi Inthanon NP on 17 January with further birds seen in flight on 20 January.

Red-breasted Parakeet Psittacula alexandri

Some very soggy birds (after heavy rain) were found coming in to roost near our resort at Khao Yai on 11 January.

Vernal Hanging Parrot Loriculus vernalis

Fairly common and seen on five days.

Long-tailed Broadbill Psarisomus dalhousiae

A flock of about 20 birds in Khao Yai on 13 January was a real bonus. Silver-breasted Broadbill Serilophus lunatus Heard at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January. **Banded Broadbill** Eurylaimus javanicus A pair showed really well in the campground at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January. Black-and-yellow Broadbill Eurylaimus ochromalus A pair showed really well in the campground at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January. Blue Pitta Hydrornis cyaneus Heard at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January. Golden-bellied Gerygone Gerygone sulphurea At least 8-10 were found in the mangroves at Khok Kham on our first day. Bar-winged Flycatcher-shrike Hemipus picatus Seen on a couple of days in Kaeng Krachan. Large Woodshrike Tephrodornis virgatus A pair in the campground at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January. Ashy Woodswallow Artamus fuscus Common and seen on six days of the trip. Common Iora Aegithina tiphia Common and seen on six days of the trip. Great Iora Aegithina lafresnayei Seen on two occasions, one in Kaeng Krachan on 10 January and Khao Yai on 12 January. Grey-chinned Minivet Pericrocotus solaris First seen at Doi Lang on 15 January with small numbers seen on a further two days in the highlands. Short-billed Minivet Pericrocotus brevirostris A pair seen at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Long-tailed Minivet Pericrocotus ethologus

First seen at Doi Lang on 15 January with small numbers on a further two days in the highlands.

Scarlet Minivet Pericrocotus speciosus

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Swinhoe's Minivet Pericrocotus cantonensis

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Rosy Minivet *Pericrocotus roseus*

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Black-winged Cuckooshrike Lalage melaschistos

Common and seen on five days of the trip.

Mangrove Whistler Pachycephala cinerea

Seen really well from the mangrove boardwalk at Khok Kham on the first day of the trip, with about six birds present.

Black-eared Shrike-babbler Pteruthius melanotis

A single bird seen very briefly in a feeding flock at Doi Lang on 15 January.

White-browed Shrike-babbler (Grey-breasted) Pteruthius aeralatus ricketti

A single bird seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Clicking Shrike-Babbler (Clicking) Pteruthius intermedius intermedius

A single bird seen really well in a feeding flock at Doi Inthanon on 18 January.

White-bellied Erpornis Erpornis zantholeuca

Fairly common in feeding flocks with birds seen on four days during the trip.

Maroon Oriole Oriolus traillii traillii/robinsoni

Heard only in the highlands.

Black-hooded Oriole Oriolus xanthornus

A very nice male in the grounds of our resort at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Black-naped Oriole (East Asian) Oriolus chinensis diffuses

Fairly common and seen on four days during the trip.

Bronzed Drongo Dicrurus aeneus

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Lesser Racket-tailed Drongo Dicrurus remifer

Seen on two days of the trip with the first at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Greater Racket-tailed Drongo Dicrurus paradiseus

Common and seen on six days.

Hair-crested Drongo Dicrurus hottentottus

Common and seen on a total of seven days.

Ashy Drongo Dicrurus leucophaeus

Very common and seen on ten days.

Black Drongo Dicrurus macrocercus

Common and seen on seven dates.

White-throated Fantail Rhipidura albicollis

Seen on four dates during the trip with the first at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Malaysian Pied Fantail Rhipidura javanica

First seen in the mangroves at Khok Kham on the first day and then on a further three days.

Black-naped Monarch Hypothymis azurea

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Blyth's Paradise Flycatcher Terpsiphone affinis

Seen twice in Kaeng Krachan on 9 and 10 January but all too briefly.

Burmese Shrike Lanius collurioides

This species has crashed in numbers over recent years but is quite easy to find in the car park at Chiang Rai Airport!! We had a very obliging bird on 14 January.

Brown Shrike (Brown) Lanius cristatus

Fairly common and seen on five dates.

Long-tailed Shrike Lanius schach

Seen on three days in the north with the first at Tha Ton on 14 January.

Eurasian Jay (White-faced) Garrulus glandarius leucotis

One of this very distinctive subspecies was seen on our last morning in the dry forest at Doi Inthanon NP.

Red-billed Blue Magpie Urocissa erythroryncha

A single bird in flight on our last morning in the dry forest at Doi Inthanon NP.

Common Green Magpie Cissa chinensis

A single individual at Khao Yai on 12 January.

Grey Treepie Dendrocitta formosae

A single bird at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Racket-tailed Treepie Crypsirina temia

A single bird in the mangroves at Khok Kham proved elusive but this was followed by excellent prolonged views from the hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Ratchet-tailed Treepie Temnurus temnurus

Heard at Kaeng Krachan.

Eastern Jungle Crow Corvus levaillantii

Fairly common and seen on six days.

Yellow-bellied Fantail Chelidorhynx hypoxanthus

Seen well at Doi Inthanon NP on 18 and 19 January. Difficult to get your bins on!!

Grey-headed Canary-flycatcher Culicicapa ceylonensis

Common and seen on eight days.

Yellow-browed Tit Sylviparus modestus

Individuals seen a couple of times at Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Sultan Tit Melanochlora sultanea

A pair of these fantastic birds were seen in Khao Yai on 13 January.

Japanese Tit Parus minor nubicolus

Seen on a couple of days in the highlands with the first at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Yellow-cheeked Tit Machlolophus spilonotus

Having heard them a couple of times, it was great to catch up with one in a feeding flock at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Indochinese Bush Lark Mirafra erythrocephala

Seen on two occasions with the first at Tha Lang on 8 January.

Oriental Skylark Alauda gulgula

First seen at Wat Khom Naran on 7 January and again the following day at Ban Ton Maphrao.

Ochraceous Bulbul Alophoixus ochraceus

Seen in Kaeng Krachan on both 9 and 10 January, and Doi Inthanon on 19 January.

Puff-throated Bulbul Alophoixus pallidus

Seen in Khao Yai on both 12 and 13 January.

Striated Bulbul Alcurus striatus

Seen at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Olive Bulbul Iole viridescens

Seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 and 10 January with the higher count being about ten individuals.

Grey-eyed Bulbul Iole propinqua

Fairly common and seen on four days of the trip with the first seen at Khao Yai on 12 January.

Ashy Bulbul Hemixos flavala

Fairly common and seen on five dates with the first at Khao Yai on 12 January.

Mountain Bulbul Ixos mcclellandii

Seen at Khao Yai on 9 January and again at Doi Inthanon on 18 and 19 January.

White-headed Bulbul Hypsipetes thompsoni

We were privileged to see this nomadic and hard to see species in the flowering cherry trees at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January. We estimated that there were about twelve birds present but there may have been more.

Black Bulbul Hypsipetes leucocephalus

One bird singing in trees in parkland within Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Black-headed Bulbul Brachypodius melanocephalos

Common in Kaeng Krachan and Khao Yai.

Black-crested Bulbul Rubigula flaviventris

Very common and seen on nine dates including the red-throated morph in the north.

Crested Finchbill Spizixos canifrons

Two of this much sought after species were seen really well near the final security gate at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Streak-eared Bulbul Pycnonotus conradi

Common and seen on six dates.

Stripe-throated Bulbul Pycnonotus finlaysoni

Common in Kaeng Krachan.

Flavescent Bulbul Pycnonotus flavescens

Fairly common and seen on five days.

Brown-breasted Bulbul Pycnonotus xanthorrhous

Another hard-to-find species present with the White-headed Bulbuls in the flowering cherry trees at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January. There were about twenty individuals present.

Red-whiskered Bulbul Pycnonotus jocosus

Seen on two days of the trip, firstly at Khao Yai on 13 January.

Yellow-vented Bulbul Pycnonotus goiavier

Seen near the coast on the first two days of the trip and again at Mae Ai paddy fields.

Sooty-headed Bulbul *Pycnonotus aurigaster*

Common and seen on six dates.

Sand Martin Riparia riparia

One seen Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Wire-tailed Swallow Hirundo smithii

A couple seen at Mae Taeng Irrigation Project on 17 January.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

Very common and seen on twelve days during the trip.

Asian House Martin Delichon dasypus

One seen in Khao Yai on 13 January.

Striated Swallow Cecropis striolata

A couple seen Tha Ton on 14 January.

Pygmy Cupwing Pnoepyga pusilla

A right little skulker. One was seen by a few of the group at Doi Inthanon on 18 January, with a 'slightly' more confiding bird the following day.

Yellow-bellied Warbler Abroscopus superciliaris

Seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 and 10 January.

Mountain Tailorbird Phyllergates cucultatus

After a couple of near misses, we finally caught up with one at Doi Inthanon on 19 January.

Slaty-bellied Tesia Tesia olivea

An individual performed well at the top of Doi Inthanon on 18 January.

Black-throated Bushtit Aegithalos concinnus

Just the one individual bird high in a tree with a feeding flock at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Buff-barred Warbler *Phylloscopus pulcher*

Seen well at Doi Inthanon on 18 January.

Ashy-throated Warbler Phylloscopus maculipennis

This smart warbler was seen well on a couple of occasions at Doi Inthanon on 18 January.

Hume's Leaf Warbler (Eastern) Phylloscopus humei mandellii

Fairly common at higher elevations, first seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Chinese Leaf Warbler *Phylloscopus yunnanensis*

A single bird at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Yellow-browed Warbler *Phylloscopus inornatus*

Very common and seen on twelve days during the trip.

Pallas's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus proregulus

This little gem was only seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Yellow-streaked Warbler Phylloscopus armandii

A single bird seen really well at Doi Inthanon NP on 17 January.

Radde's Warbler Phylloscopus schwarzi

A really skulking bird was followed by a really showy bird at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Dusky Warbler Phylloscopus fuscatus

Seen a couple of times in the mangroves at Khok Kham on our first day. Never common but seen on four days in total.

Buff-throated Warbler Phylloscopus subaffinis

Heard at Doi Lang and Doi Ang Khang.

White-spectacled Warbler Phylloscopus intermedius

A rare bird in Thailand with a single bird seen very well at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Alström's Warbler Phylloscopus soror

A couple seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Martens's Warbler Phylloscopus omeiensis

Seen on three dates with the first bird at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Two-barred Warbler

Small numbers noted at Kaeng Krachan and Khoa Yai, particularly in feeding flocks.

Greenish Warbler (trochiloides/ludlowi) Phylloscopus trochiloides trochiloides/ludlowi

One seen well at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Sakhalin Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus borealoides

A single bird noted in the grounds of our resort at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Pale-legged Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus tenellipes

Single bird seen at Khao Yai on 12 January.

Chestnut-crowned Warbler Phylloscopus castaniceps

Seen on three days of the trip with the first at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Sulphur-breasted Warbler Phylloscopus ricketti

At least a couple of birds seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Blyth's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus reguloides

Small numbers at the top of Doi Inthanon on 18 January.

Claudia's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus claudiae

Seen on four days with the first at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Davison's Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus intensior

Seen on four days with the first at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Oriental Reed Warbler Acrocephalus orientalis

Seen on four dates with some showy individuals at Phraek Nam Daeng and Hat Chao Samran marshes.

Black-browed Reed Warbler Acrocephalus bistrigiceps

A couple of birds seen well at Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on 6 January.

Thick-billed Warbler Arundinax aedon

Heard at numerous locations during the trip with one showing quite well at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Pallas's Grasshopper Warbler Helopsaltes certhiola

A very obliging individual at Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on 6 January.

Lanceolated Warbler Locustella lanceolata

This skulker showed for most of the group at Mae Ai on 16 January.

Baikal Bush Warbler Locustella davidi

One showed well at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Striated Grassbird Megalurus palustris

A couple seen perched up at Mae Ai on 16 January.

Zitting Cisticola Cisticola juncidis

A couple seen briefly at Wat Khom Naran on 7 January and Khao Yai on 12 January.

Golden-headed Cisticola Cisticola exilis

Found at Khao Yai on 12 January but not seen well.

Hill Prinia Prinia superciliaris

First seen at Doi Lang on 15 January and again at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Rufescent Prinia Prinia rufescens

A family group performed really well at Khao Yai on 13 January.

Grey-breasted Prinia Prinia hodgsonii

One seen well just outside our resort grounds at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Yellow-bellied Prinia Prinia flaviventris

Seen on a couple of occasions with the first at Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on 6 January.

Plain Prinia Prinia inornate

Seen on the first three days of the trip. **Common Tailorbird** Orthotomus sutorius Common and found on nine dates. Dark-necked Tailorbird Orthotomus atrogularis

Fairly common and seen on five days.

Spot-breasted Parrotbill Paradoxornis guttaticollis

A single bird at Doi Lang on 15 January initially 'played hard to get' but eventually showed exceptionally well. One of the major highlights of the trip.

Grey-headed Parrotbill Paradoxornis gularis

An unexpected find at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January. There were about ten birds present feeding on cherry blossom.

Chestnut-flanked White-eye Zosterops erythropleurus

Good sized flocks were noted on 12 and 13 January in Khao Yai and again on 15 January at Doi Lang.

Swinhoe's White-eye Zosterops simplex

At least four birds seen flying over at Khok Kham mangroves on our first day were followed by c10 on 13 January at Khao Yai.

Hume's White-eye Zosterops auriventer

Three birds were found in a white-eye flock at Khao Yai on 13 January.

Indian White-eye Zosterops palpebrosus

One bird at Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Chestnut-capped Babbler Timalia pileate

A pair played hard to get at Mae Ai on 16 January but were seen by some of the group.

Pin-striped Tit-babbler Mixornis gularis

Seen on three dates with the first at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Golden Babbler Cyanoderma chrysaeum

Some of the group missed a bird at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January but everyone got onto another individual at Doi Inthanon on 18 January. A smart looking babbler.

Rufous-fronted Babbler Cyanoderma rufifrons

Seen on 9 and 10 January in Kaeng Krachan.

Buff-chested Babbler Cyanoderma ambiguum

A couple seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

White-browed Scimitar Babbler Pomatorhinus schisticeps

Seen on three dates with the best views being from the bird hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Large Scimitar Babbler Erythrogenys hypoleucos

Heard at Khao Yai.

Rusty-cheeked Scimitar Babbler Erythrogenys erythrogenys

Seen really well at Doi Lang on 15 January at various locations and involving about six birds.

Grey-throated Babbler Stachyris nigriceps

Another smart looking babbler with birds seen at Doi Inthanon NP on 18 and 19 January. At least four birds showed really well from the bird hide.

Collared Babbler Gampsorhynchus torquatus

Heard at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Rufous-winged Fulvetta Schoeniparus castaneceps

Great looks at about ten birds at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Puff-throated Babbler Pellorneum ruficeps

Seen on a couple of occasions in Kaeng Krachan on 8 January, including from the bird hide, and again at Khao Yai on 13 January.

Spot-throated Babbler Pellorneum albiventre

Heard at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Buff-breasted Babbler Pellorneum tickelli

A couple of birds in front of the bird hide at Doi Inthanon on 19 January.

Abbott's Babbler Malacocincla abbotti

A single individual was seen by some of the group in the grounds of our resort at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Streaked Wren-babbler Gypsophila brevicaudata

Heard at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Rufous Limestone Babbler Gypsophila calcicole ENDEMIC

The only true endemic of the trip with two birds showing very well at Wat Phra Phuttabat Noi on 11 January.

Brown-cheeked Fulvetta Alcippe poioicephala

Seen on two days with the first from the bird hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Yunnan Fulvetta Alcippe fratercula

Seen on four days with the first at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Silver-eared Laughingthrush Trochalopteron melanostigma

Four birds were present at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Dark-backed Sibia Heterophasia melanoleuca

Fairly common in the highlands and seen on four days with the first at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Blue-winged Minla Actinodura cyanouroptera

A couple at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Bar-throated Minla Actinodura strigula

Seen at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Spectacled Barwing (Western) Actinodura ramsayi ramsayi

Seen well at Doi Lang on 15 January and Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Silver-eared Mesia Leiothrix argentauris

A small flock of about ten birds was a fine sight amongst the cherry blossom at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January. A similar-sized flock was then found at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Rufous-backed Sibia Leioptila annectens

Good numbers at both Doi Lang on 15 January and Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Scarlet-faced Liocichla Liocichla ripponi

Two of these stunning and much sought after birds showed well at Doi Lang on 15 January close to the last checkpoint.

Lesser Necklaced Laughingthrush Garrulax monileger

Two individuals at the bird hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January provided a nice comparison with a group on Greater Necklaced Laughingthrushes. Several birds were also seen at Khao Yai on 12 January.

White-crested Laughingthrush Garrulax leucolophus

Fantastic birds and seen incredibly well in front of the bird hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January and again in Khao Yai on 12 January.

Black-throated Laughingthrush Pterorhinus chinensis

Heard at Khao Yai on 12 January.

White-browed Laughingthrush Pterorhinus sannio

Two at Doi Ang Khan on 16 January.

Greater Necklaced Laughingthrush Pterorhinus pectoralis

A group of about twelve individuals spent quite a lot of time in front of the hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Asian Fairy-bluebird Irena puella

Fairly common and seen on four days.

Giant Nuthatch Sitta magna

At least a couple of birds seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Velvet-fronted Nuthatch Sitta frontalis

Fairly common and seen on four days of the trip.

Chestnut-vented Nuthatch Sitta nagaensis

Seen well at both Doi Lang on 15 January and Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Hume's Treecreeper Certhia manipurensis

A couple of birds at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Golden-crested MynaAmpeliceps coronatus

It was a real surprise finding about ten birds perched in a dead tree in Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Common Hill Myna Gracula religiosa

Fairly common and seen on four dates.

Great Myna Acridotheres grandis

Common and seen on eight days of the trip.

Common Myna Acridotheres tristis

Common and seen on eight dates.

Spot-winged Starling Saroglossa spilopterus

A rare bird in Thailand with about twenty individuals present in a flowering tree at Nong Khang Reservoir on 17 January.

Black-collared Starling Gracupica nigricollis

Fairly common in the north and seen on four dates.

Siamese Pied Myna Gracupica floweri

Fairly common in the south and seen on four days of the trip.

Chestnut-tailed Starling Sturnia malabaricag

A couple of substantial flocks seen at Tha Ton on 14 January and Nong Khang Reservoir on 17 January.

Black-breasted Thrush Turdus dissimilis

At least five birds were present in the monastery grounds at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Eyebrowed Thrush Turdus obscurus

Single birds at Doi Lang on 15 January and Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Grey-sided Thrush Turdus feae

After a bit of a wait, three birds came in to a fruiting tree at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Oriental Magpie-robin Copsychus saularis

Fairly common and seen on six days of the trip.

White-rumped Shama Copsychus malabaricus

Fairly common and seen on five dates.

Dark-sided Flycatcher Muscicapa sibirica

A single bird at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Asian Brown Flycatcher (Northern) Muscicapa dauurica dauurica

Two birds of this subspecies at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January and in our resort grounds on 11 January.

Rufous-bellied Niltava Niltava Sundara

Found on two days of the trip with the best views in front of the bird hide at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Chinese Vivid Niltava Niltava oatesi

Brief views of a male at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Large Niltava Niltava grandis

Seen on three days with the first being a pair in the monastery grounds at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Verditer Flycatcher Eumyias thalassinus

Common and seen on six days of the trip.

White-gorgeted Flycatcher Anthipes monileger

Heard at Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Pale Blue Flycatcher (Unicoloured) Cyornis unicolor unicolor

Heard at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Chinese Blue Flycatcher Cyornis glaucicomans

Seen really well in front of the hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January and again in the park on 10 January.

Hainan Blue Flycatcher Cyornis hainanus

Fairly common and seen on five days of the trip.

Indochinese Blue Flycatcher Cyornis sumatrensis

Seen on two dates: at the hides in Kaeng Krachan on 8 January and Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Hill Blue Flycatcher Cyornis whitei

Fairly common and seen on five days of the trip.

White-bellied Redstart Luscinia phaenicuroides

A skulking bird at Doi Lang on 15 January.

White-tailed Robin Myiomela leucura

Seen really well at both Doi Ang Khang on 16 January and in front of the hide at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Siberian Rubythroat Calliope calliope

A female type showed very well just outside our resort grounds at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Black-backed Forktail Enicurus immaculatus

A pair were on the river as we crossed into the dry forest at lower elevation in Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Slaty-backed Forktail Enicurus schistaceus

A pair seen well on one of the rivers in Khao Yai on 13 January.

Blue Whistling Thrush (Black-billed) Myophonus caeruleus caeruleus

An individual from this subspecies group was seen at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Blue Whistling Thrush (Yellow-billed) Myophonus caeruleus flavirostris

This subspecies group was relatively common and seen on six days of the trip.

Himalayan Shortwing Brachypteryx cruralis

Normally quite hard to see but a very obliging male performed exceptionally well at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Siberian Blue Robin Larvivora cyane

At least a couple of female/immature birds were seen from both bird hides at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January and Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Slaty-blue Flycatcher Ficedula tricolor

Just one female type bird at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Snowy-browed Flycatcher Ficedula hyperythra

A very nice male in front of the hide at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Slaty-backed Flycatcher Ficedula Erithacus

A female type at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Rufous-gorgeted Flycatcher Ficedula strophiata

One at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Sapphire Flycatcher Ficedula sapphira

A bright individual, possibly a non-breeding male, was high in trees at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Ultramarine Flycatcher Ficedula superciliaris

A female type at Doi Land on 15 January.

Little Pied Flycatcher Ficedula westermanni

Two males and a female type at Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Taiga Flycatcher Ficedula albicilla

Common and seen on seven days of the trip.

Himalayan Bluetail Tarsiger rufilatus

A female type presumed to be of this species (and not Red-flanked) at the top of Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Plumbeous Water Redstart Phoenicurus fuliginosus

A single bird on the river by our lunch stop in Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

White-capped Redstart Phoenicurus leucocephalus

A single bird on the river by our lunch stop in Doi Inthanon NP on 18 January.

Daurian Redstart Phoenicurus auroreus

A lone bird in the ornamental gardens at Doi Ang Khang gave us the run around on 16 January.

Chestnut-bellied Rock Thrush Monticola rufiventris

A single bird seen briefly by some of the group in the monastery grounds at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Blue Rock Thrush Monticola solitarius

Single birds at both Doi Lang on 15 January and Doi Ang Khang the following day.

Jerdon's Bush Chat Saxicola jerdoni

A rare find by the river at Tha Ton on 14 January. A single bird, probably a non-breeding male.

Grey Bush Chat Saxicola ferreus

Seen well at the pheasant stakeout at Doi Lan on 15 January.

Pied Bush Chat Saxicola caprata

A few birds were present in the fields around Tha Ton on 14 January.

Amur Stonechat Saxicola stejnegeri

Fairly common and seen on six days of the trip.

Greater Green Leafbird Chloropsis sonnerati

We had good views of a male at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Blue-winged Leafbird Chloropsis moluccensis

Seen at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January and Khoa Yai on 13 January.

Golden-fronted Leafbird Chloropsis aurifrons

Recorded in the grounds of our resort at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January and in the dry forest at Doi Inthanon NP on 20 January.

Orange-bellied Leafbird Chloropsis hardwickii

A male in the monastery grounds at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Thick-billed Flowerpecker Dicaeum agile

A couple at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Yellow-vented Flowerpecker Dicaeum chrysorrheum

First recorded at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January and then again in Khao Yai on 13 January.

Plain Flowerpecker Dicaeum minullum

Seen on three days of the trip with the first individual at Kaeng Krachan on 9 January.

Fire-breasted Flowerpecker Dicaeum ignipectus

Seen on three days in the highlands with the first individual in Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Cambodian Flowerpecker Dicaeum cambodianum

A recent split from Fire-breasted Flowerpecker with about four seen at Khao Yai on 13 January.

Scarlet-backed Flowerpecker Dicaeum cruentatum

Seen on two days with the first in the resort grounds at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Ruby-cheeked Sunbird Chalcoparia singalensis

Seen at Kaeng Krachan on 9 and 10 January.

Brown-throated Sunbird Anthreptes malacensis

The first bird was a lovely male seen at a garage stop on the way to Khao Yai on 11 January.

Van Hasselt's Sunbird Leptocoma brasiliana

Only seen at Khao Yai on 12 January where about six birds were found on our forest walk.

Purple Sunbird Cinnyris asiaticus

A fine male in the grounds of our resort at Tha Ton on 17 January was followed by a female on our last morning at Doi Inthanon NP on 20 January.

Ornate Sunbird Cinnyris ornatus

Recently split from Olive-backed Sunbird and quite common with sightings on six days of the trip.

Mrs. Gould's Sunbird (Scarlet-breasted) Aethopyga gouldiae dabryii

Common and seen on four days in the highlands.

Green-tailed Sunbird (Doi Inthanon) Aethopyga nipalensis angkanensis

Seen at the top of Doi Inthanon on 18 January but quite common with around twenty individuals recorded.

Black-throated Sunbird Aethopyga saturate

Seen on four days with the first at Doi Inthanon on 9 January.

Crimson Sunbird Aethopyga siparaja

Seen on three days with the first, a lovely male, at Kaeng Krachan on 10 January.

Little Spiderhunter Arachnothera longirostra

Seen on three dates with the best sighting in front of the bird hide at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Streaked Spiderhunter Arachnothera magna

Fiybd on three days with great views in front of the bird hide at Doi Inthanon NP on 19 January.

Eurasian Tree Sparrow Passer montanus

Common and seen on seven days.

Plain-backed Sparrow Passer flaveolus

This species has now become hard to find and sadly we only found one male at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January. Apparently, pressure on nesting sites from the increasing numbers of House Sparrows is the reason for their decline.

House Sparrow Passer domesticus

Very common in the lowlands and seen on four dates.

Asian Golden Weaver Ploceus hypoxanthus

Good numbers seen at both Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on 6 January and Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Streaked Weaver Ploceus manyar

Seen at both Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on 6 January and Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Baya Weaver Ploceus philippinus

Seen on three dates with very large numbers present at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Scaly-breasted Munia Lonchura punctulate

A few small flocks seen on three dates.

White-rumped Munia Lonchura striata

Two small flocks with the first noted from the grounds of our resort at Tha Ton on 17 January.

Chestnut Munia Lonchura atricapilla

Seen at Phraek Nam Daeng marshes on 6 January with about ten birds present.

Forest Wagtail Dendronanthus indicus

Heard at Kaeng Krachan on 11 January.

Eastern Yellow Wagtail Motacilla tschutschensis

Seen on four days of the trip. The first bird at Khok Kham on 6 January was a '*plexa*' type and a bird at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January was a Manchurian Eastern Yellow Wagtail (subspecies *macronyx*). Other birds were not assigned to subspecies.

Citrine Wagtail (Citrine) Motacilla citreola citreola

Only seen in flight at Mae Ai on 16 January with about ten birds present.

Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea

Common and seen on seven days of the trip.

White Wagtail Motacilla alba

Seen on three days of the trip. All birds were Chinese White Wagtail (subspecies *leucopsis*).

Richard's Pipit Anthus richardi

Seen on two days with the first bird seen well at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Paddyfield Pipit Anthus rufulus

Seen on four days with the first at Tha Lang on 8 January.

Olive-backed Pipit Anthus hodgsoni

At least twelve birds were seen really well at the pheasant stake out at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Red-throated Pipit*Anthus cervinus*

Seen on three days of the trip but, as always with this species, mostly in flight. A bird on the ground was scoped at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

Spot-winged Grosbeak Mycerobas melanozanthos

A good find at Doi Lang on 15 January with a pair present.

Common Rosefinch Carpodacus erythrinus

A few seen at Doi Ang Khang on 16 January.

Yellow-breasted Bunting Emberiza aureola

A bird in massive decline and now considered critically endangered, so it was a pleasure to see around three hundred at Ban Ton Maphrao on 8 January.

SYSTEMATIC LIST: MAMMALS

Asian Elephant Elephas maximus

A male seen on a couple of occasions in Khao Yai on 12 January.

Sun Bear Helarctos malayanus

A fantastic bonus with a male at the campground in Kaeng Krachan at lunchtime on 8 January.

Smooth-coated Otter Lutrogale perspicillata

A great find at a lake in Khao Yai on 13 January with at least three animals present.

Bengal Slow Loris Nycticebus bengalensis

Another excellent find on an evening walk in the grounds of our resort, Baan Maka Nature Lodge, at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Northern Treeshrew Tupaia belangeri

One or two were watched from the hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January with another seen at Khao Yai on 12 January

Northern Pig-tailed Macaque Macaca leonina

Seen in Khao Yai on both 12 and 13 January.

Rhesus Macaque Macaca mulatta

Around 10-20 at Doi Lang on 15 January.

Long-tailed Macaque Macaca fascicularis

Around 30-40 present in Wat Phra Phuttabat Noi temple grounds on 11 January.

Dusky (Leaf Monkey) Langar Trachypithecus obscurus

Small troupes at Kaeng Krachan on 9 and 10 January.

Pileated Gibbon Hylobates pileatus

Heard in Khao Yai on 12 January.

Lar Gibbon Hylobates lar

A pair performed really well at Kaeng Krachan in the morning on 9 January with others seen on 10 January. Also heard at Khao Yai.

Malayan Porcupine Hystrix brachyura

A great find by Erth, our driver, as we were leaving Khao Yai on 13 January.

Black Giant Squirrel Ratufa bicolor

Small numbers in Kaeng Krachan on 10 January and at Khao Yai on 13 January.

Himalayan Striped Squirrel Tamiops mcclellandii

Fairly common and seen on seven days.

Indochinese Ground Squirrel Menetes berdmorei

At least a couple in front of the bird hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Grey-bellied Squirrel *Callosciurus caniceps*

Fairly common and seen on six dates.

Pallas's Squirrel Callosciurus erythraeus

Fairly common and seen on five days.

Finlayson's Squirrel Callosciurus finlaysonii

Seen in Khao Yai on three days.

Phayre's Flying Squirrel Hylopetes phayrei

Seen flying on the evening walk in the resort grounds at Doi Inthanon NP on 17 January and heard the following evening.

Lesser (Mouse Deer) Indo-Malayan Chevrotain Tragulus kanchil

At least three or four of these tiny little deer (the smallest known hoofed mammal in the world) were seen from the hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January.

Northern Red Muntjac Muntiacus vaginalis

Two or three seen in Khao Yai on 12 and 13 January.

Sambar Rusa unicolor

Two or three in Khao Yai on 12 January and 13 January.

Yellow-throated Marten Martes flavigula

Two appeared in front of the bird hide at Kaeng Krachan on 8 January. Unbelievably, we had a further three individuals in Kaeng Krachan on 10 January, one feeding on falling fruit in the road and two together in the forest.

Lyle's Flying Fox *Pteropus lylei*

A roost of around one hundred individuals from our boat at Laem Pak Bia on 7 January. That same evening at Laem Pak Bia Royal Project there were 10-20,000, maybe more, heading out from their roosts to feed.
